UNITED NATIONS SECURITY COUNCIL

(UNSC)



The United Nations Security Council is the cornerstone of international diplomacy, charged with the task of maintaining world peace and stability. The UNSC is tasked with imposing sanctions and undertaking peacekeeping missions. The mandates passed by this committee involve authorising military interventions and implementing sanctions to ensure global peace.

The UNSC simulates real-world international relations and diplomacy, enabling delegates to understand complex global power dynamics while finding solutions to maintain peace and security. The UNSC teaches delegates the working of international bodies like the UN while also teaching them public speaking, networking, debating, negotiations and resolution drafting.

Agenda 1

Addressing the Ongoing Conflict Between Sudan and the Rapid Support Forces and Its Regional Implications

The conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces has triggered a severe humanitarian crisis and mass displacement, destabilizing Sudan and affecting neighboring regions. Refugee flows and disrupted trade threaten the Horn of Africa and the Sahel. The UNSC will deliberate on ceasefire mechanisms, humanitarian access, peacekeeping mandates, targeted sanctions, and mediation efforts. Delegates must balance sovereignty with accountability to prevent further regional spillover and support long-term stability, human rights protection, and the restoration of governance in Sudan.

Agenda 2

Addressing Rising Diplomatic Tensions Between the United States and Greenland Following Recent Statements and Threats

Recent tensions regarding sovereignty between the United States and Greenlandic authorities have raised concerns over territorial integrity and Arctic stability. Given Greenland's strategic importance and its ties with Denmark, escalating friction could intensify geopolitical competition. The UNSC will examine diplomatic solutions, confidence-building measures, and multilateral dialogue to prevent coercion and reinforce international law. The objective is to ensure peaceful dispute resolution while preserving the Arctic as a region of cooperation and stability.



DISARMAMENT AND INTERNATIONAL SECURITY COMMITTEE

(DISEC)



The Disarmament and International Security Committee (DISEC) deals with issues regarding nuclear disarmament, conventional arms control, regional conflicts, terrorism, and emerging threats like cyber security. The resolutions passed by the committee lay the framework for many international treaties and agreements. The committee focuses on formulating plans for international stability and global security through disarmament and world peace.

Delegates in this committee explore topics ranging from nuclear disarmament and terrorism to cyberattacks and the use of artificial intelligence as a weapon. Delegates learn about international security, the role of non-state actors, security strategies and proposing solutions to pressing conflicts.

Agenda 1

Regulating Artificial Intelligence and Emerging Military Technologies

Delegates must assess whether to ban, restrict, or regulate AI-driven military technologies while ensuring meaningful human control. Key concerns include dual-use AI, autonomous weapons, hypersonic systems, and quantum technologies, which complicate export controls and challenge international law. DISEC will work to build consensus on global standards, accountability mechanisms, and transparency frameworks. The aim is to prevent misuse, reduce destabilizing competition, and balance technological innovation with collective security, ensuring emerging systems do not trigger an unregulated arms race or undermine global stability.

Agenda 2

Nuclear Terrorism Prevention and Securing Radiological Material

This agenda addresses the risk of terrorist groups acquiring nuclear or radiological materials. While constructing nuclear weapons is complex, radiological materials used in medicine and industry remain vulnerable to misuse. DISEC will examine gaps in physical protection, border controls, and illicit trafficking networks. The committee will focus on strengthening international cooperation, improving regulatory frameworks, and enhancing capacity-building to secure sensitive materials and prevent non-state actors from exploiting weaknesses in global nuclear security systems.



UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY (LEGAL)

(UNGA)



The United Nations General Assembly (Legal) is the primary forum within the UN system responsible for handling issues related to international law. As one of the six main committees of the General Assembly, its mandate focuses on developing, codifying, and promoting adherence to international legal norms that govern relations among states. The committee's work strengthens the international rule of law, supports peaceful dispute resolution, and enhances the legal framework of global governance. The Committee addresses a wide range of legal issues, including the law of treaties, state responsibility, international criminal law, counter-terrorism legal frameworks, diplomatic and consular relations, peaceful uses of outer space, cybersecurity law, and the protection of UN personnel. For students, the Committee provides a structured platform to negotiate precise legal solutions, interpret international law, and craft texts that balance state sovereignty with global legal obligations.

Agenda 1

Regulating Artificial Intelligence and Emerging Military Technologies

Delegates will assess the effectiveness of existing international humanitarian and human rights laws in addressing gender-based violence in conflict and post-conflict settings. Discussions will focus on strengthening enforcement, improving monitoring mechanisms, and determining whether new legal instruments are required. The committee will examine the responsibilities of states, non-state actors, and peacekeeping missions while addressing gaps in implementation and resource constraints. The objective is to enhance accountability, prioritize survivor protection and reparations, and build stronger international cooperation to deter gender-based violence globally.

Agenda 2

Developing an International Legal Framework for Cybersecurity and State Behaviour in Cyberspace

This agenda addresses the risk of terrorist groups acquiring nuclear or radiological materials. While constructing nuclear weapons is complex, radiological materials used in medicine and industry remain vulnerable to misuse. DISEC will examine gaps in physical protection, border controls, and illicit trafficking networks. UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

(UNHCR)



The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) is a UN agency that helps protect and support refugees, displaced people, and stateless populations worldwide. It ensures that people forced to leave their homes due to conflict, persecution, or disasters are safe and receive basic necessities like shelter, food, healthcare, and education. UNHCR also works with countries and organizations to find long-term solutions, such as returning home safely, integrating locally, or resettling in another country, while advocating for the rights of displaced people.

Delegates in the UNHCR committee act as representatives of countries or organizations and discuss real refugee crises. They debate policies, propose solutions, and draft resolutions to address humanitarian issues, balancing the needs of displaced people with the interests of different nations. This committee helps delegates understand global migration challenges while practicing negotiation, diplomacy, and problem-solving skills.

Agenda 1

Addressing the Syrian Refugee Crisis Resulting from Prolonged Conflict and Its Impact on Host Countries

The Syrian conflict has displaced millions, placing significant pressure on neighboring states and host communities. Overcrowded shelters, limited access to education and healthcare, and unemployment remain major challenges. The committee will explore sustainable solutions that balance refugee protection with host country capacity. Discussions will include international burden-sharing, funding mechanisms, improved access to essential services, and long-term integration strategies. The objective is to promote stability, dignity, and durable protection for displaced populations while supporting affected host nations.

Agenda 2

Addressing the Humanitarian and Protection Challenges Arising from Large-Scale Deportations in Latin America

Large-scale deportations have exposed individuals to unsafe conditions, restricted services, and protection risks. Sudden returns also strain local authorities with limited resources. The committee will focus on strengthening legal safeguards, regional cooperation, and humanitarian support systems. Delegates will develop strategies to ensure safe reintegration, protect fundamental rights, and prevent further instability while balancing migration policies with humanitarian obligations.



UNITED NATIONS OFFICE ON DRUGS AND CRIME

(UNODC)



The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) is the primary UN body responsible for addressing issues related to transnational crime, drug trafficking, terrorism, corruption, and criminal justice reform. UNODC operates on three core mandates: drug control, crime prevention and criminal justice, and counter-terrorism. In drug control, it works to combat illicit drug production, trafficking, and abuse through evidence-based prevention, treatment, and supply-reduction strategies. In crime prevention, UNODC leads global efforts against human trafficking, migrant smuggling, organized crime networks, cybercrime, wildlife crime, and corruption by promoting stronger legal frameworks, improved law-enforcement capabilities, and cross-border coordination.

Delegates provide a platform to debate complex global security and governance challenges, negotiate cooperative solutions, and develop sustainable, multi-stakeholder approaches to combatting crime and illicit activities worldwide.

Agenda 1

Strengthening frameworks on decriminalisation and corruption prevention

This agenda examines the link between criminal justice reform and corruption that enables drug trafficking and organized crime. While some states consider decriminalising minor drug offenses to reduce prison overcrowding and prioritize public health, weak oversight can allow exploitation by criminal networks. Delegates must evaluate how to reinforce institutional integrity and effectively implement the UN Convention against Corruption (UNCAC). The focus will be on transparency, whistleblower protection, accountability mechanisms, and harmonising reform efforts with strong anti-corruption safeguards to prevent misuse and uphold the rule of law.

Agenda 2

Combating Child Exploitation and Abuse

This agenda addresses the growing threat of child exploitation, particularly in digital spaces where offenders operate across borders. Technological advances, conflict, and socioeconomic vulnerability increase risks. The committee will explore stronger legislation, international cooperation, prevention strategies, and regulation of online environments. The objective is to develop coordinated, rights-based frameworks that protect children, enhance survivor support, and ensure effective prosecution of perpetrators while safeguarding fundamental freedoms.



UNITED NATIONS COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN

(UNCSW)



The United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) is the principal global intergovernmental body dedicated to advancing gender equality and empowering women. Established in 1946 and operating under the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), UNCSW plays a central role in shaping international norms and policies related to women's rights. Its mandate includes monitoring global progress, identifying challenges, setting standards, and formulating concrete policies to promote gender equality in all spheres of life. UNCSW collaborates closely with UN Women, civil society organizations, and global advocacy groups to integrate women's perspectives into international development and human rights agendas. It also supports capacity building and technical assistance to strengthen national legislation and institutional mechanisms for gender equality.

For MUN delegates, UNCSW provides a platform to negotiate rights-based, inclusive, and intersectional policies that promote women's empowerment and eliminate structural barriers faced by women and girls worldwide.

Agenda 1

Assessing Health Infrastructure and Its Role in Ensuring Accessible Healthcare for Women, with Special Emphasis on Abortion Rights

In many regions, inadequate health systems, limited trained professionals, and restrictive laws restrict women's access to reproductive and maternal healthcare. These barriers increase preventable health risks and disproportionately affect marginalized communities. Delegates will examine ways to strengthen primary healthcare, expand affordable services, improve provider training, and align national policies with human rights standards. The goal is to promote safe, equitable, and rights-based healthcare that protects women's autonomy and long-term well-being.

Agenda 2

Enhancing Legal Recognition and Social Security Rights for Women Engaged in Informal Employment

Women in informal employment often lack legal protection, stable income, and access to social benefits, increasing vulnerability to exploitation. The committee will explore labor reforms, portable social protection systems, and gender-responsive policies that formalize work and expand economic security. The objective is to promote dignity, equal opportunity, and sustainable economic independence for women globally.



WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION

(WHO)



The World Health Organisation (WHO) is a specialised agency of the United Nations responsible for international public health. It has addressed pandemics (COVID-19, H1N1, Ebola), vaccination campaigns (polio eradication), and universal health coverage. It is crucial in coordinating international responses to health emergencies and promoting universal health coverage, disease prevention, and health equity worldwide.

WHO is important for delegates because it allows them to explore global health issues like pandemics, mental health, healthcare access, and understand the organisation's proceedings. Engaging with WHO topics enhances critical thinking, research, and analytical skills. Delegates learn to interpret health data, evaluate the impact of diseases, and propose realistic solutions. This exposure also encourages interest in public health, medicine, global development, and international relations.

Agenda 1

Addressing the Health & Humanitarian Crisis in the Greater Horn of Africa: Combating Malnutrition, Disease Outbreaks, & Sanitation Practices

The Greater Horn of Africa faces a severe health crisis driven by drought, conflict, economic instability, and displacement. Countries such as Somalia, Ethiopia, South Sudan, and Kenya are experiencing acute malnutrition, food insecurity, and limited healthcare access. Recurrent outbreaks of cholera, measles, and malaria further strain fragile systems, while inadequate water and sanitation accelerate disease spread. The committee will focus on strengthening healthcare delivery, expanding nutrition and vaccination programs, improving WASH services, and promoting coordinated regional action. Emphasis will be placed on sustainable funding, community engagement, and long-term resilience to protect vulnerable populations.

Agenda 2

The Mental Health Crisis of Long-Term Displacement: From Trauma-Informed Care to the Right to Psychological Well-Being for Refugees and IDPs

Prolonged displacement has created a significant mental health crisis among refugees and internally displaced persons. Exposure to violence, uncertainty, and economic hardship increases risks of depression, anxiety, and trauma-related disorders, while stigma and limited services hinder care. The committee will explore integrating trauma-informed approaches into humanitarian responses, expanding community-based support, training frontline workers, and recognizing psychological well-being as a core component of humanitarian protection frameworks.



SOCIAL, HUMANITARIAN AND CULTURAL COMMITTEE

(SOCHUM)



The Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Committee (SOCHUM) focuses on a broad spectrum of issues related to human rights, social development, and cultural affairs. SOCHUM deals with a wide spectrum of issues ranging from social justice, humanitarian crises and cultural tolerance. SOCHUM deals with issues regarding gender equality, education, protection of refugees and protection of indigenous people.

Delegates participating in this committee cultivate empathy and a nuanced grasp of socio-cultural complexities. The committee setting challenges delegates to navigate intricate issues and differing viewpoints, fostering their capacity to respect diverse cultures and intellectual approaches as they collaboratively craft resolutions.

Agenda 1

Advancing the Rights of Indigenous Peoples; Protecting Cultural Heritage in the Face of Development Projects and Climate Change

Indigenous communities face growing threats from industrial expansion and climate change, leading to displacement and loss of ancestral lands and traditions. These challenges weaken cultural heritage and undermine traditional environmental knowledge. SOCHUM will examine legal protections, land rights safeguards, and mandatory consultation in development initiatives. Delegates must ensure that climate action and economic growth respect self-determination and incorporate indigenous perspectives. The goal is to develop practical measures that preserve cultural heritage while balancing development with fundamental rights.

Agenda 2

Addressing Digital Dependency Among Youth Driven by Algorithmic Reinforcement Mechanisms

Algorithm-driven social media platforms have increased digital dependency among youth, affecting mental health, social behavior, and academic performance. Delegates will explore strategies to reduce harmful impacts while preserving innovation. Discussions will focus on digital literacy, ethical technology standards, regulatory safeguards, and responsible platform design. The objective is to protect young people's psychological and social well-being while promoting safe and balanced digital engagement.



FÉDÉRATION INTERNATIONALE DE L'AUTOMOBILE

(FIA)



The Fédération Internationale de l'Automobile (FIA) Committee serves as the central governing authority for global motorsport and international motoring organizations. It is responsible for establishing regulations, setting safety standards, and overseeing the development and conduct of motorsport across all levels. Within this committee, delegates engage in structured discussions and policy formulation on a wide range of issues that shape the present and future of racing.

Agenda 1

Regulating Driver Contracts, Junior Academies, and Long-Term Talent Control in Formula 1

Formula 1 teams increasingly secure young talent through junior academies and long-term contracts. While these pathways provide funding and structured development, they raise concerns about driver autonomy, restrictive clauses, and limited career mobility. Expensive buy-outs and preferential control by leading teams can disrupt competitive balance. Delegates will examine transparent contract standards, fair release mechanisms, and welfare safeguards. The goal is to balance commercial interests with ethical regulation, ensuring equal opportunity, integrity, and a sustainable talent pipeline within the F1 ecosystem.

Agenda 2

Reviewing and Reforming the 2027 Power Unit Regulations to Balance Sustainability, Performance and Competitive Parity

As Formula 1 approaches the 2027 season, the post-2026 power unit framework requires evaluation. While emphasizing sustainable fuels and increased electrical power, disparities between manufacturers and customer teams may threaten parity. Discussions will address cost controls, hybrid system efficiency, and competitive safeguards. The committee will aim to refine regulations to maintain environmental progress without compromising performance quality or economic balance, ensuring an innovative and equitable power unit landscape for all competitors.



ALL INDIA POLITICAL PARTIES MEET

(AIPPM)



The All India Political Parties Meet (AIPPM) is a simulation of a national-level discussion among major Indian political parties. The committee offers a platform for delegates to debate pressing domestic issues like national security, education, or economic reforms from diverse political perspectives. AIPPM encourages awareness of Indian politics, enhances public speaking and negotiation skills, and helps delegates understand the complexities of democratic decision-making and multi-party governance.

Agenda 1

Deliberating on AI Misuse and Its Impact on Politics, Citizen Rights, and Ethics

Rapid AI advancement has introduced tools like deepfakes and automated misinformation that threaten democratic integrity. These technologies are increasingly exploited in political campaigns and personal attacks to spread false narratives, often targeting marginalized groups and undermining public trust. The committee will focus on creating regulatory frameworks to curb AI-enabled harassment and disinformation. Delegates must balance innovation with ethical safeguards, proposing national strategies to ensure transparency in digital campaigning and protect the fundamental rights of all citizens against algorithmic manipulation.

Agenda 2
